Exhibition launch in New Zealand

AN exhibition by Sydney artist Thea Weiss documenting the life of her mother-inlaw, Lotte Weiss – a Holocaust survivor who left Europe for Wellington after World War II – is currently on display in the New Zealand capital.

Lotte, who was born in 1923, is well known for her work as a guide at the Sydney Jewish Museum.

The artworks in the *My Two Lives* exhibition cover Lotte's time at the Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp and Theresienstadt during World War II, and her years in New Zealand and Australia. The exhibition was officially opened last week by Nancy Gilbert, the wife of the US ambassador to New Zealand, Mark Gilbert.

Thea is a studio-based printmaker and painter who graduated with a bachelor of fine art in painting from the National Art School in Sydney in 2006, and an MA in printmaking from UNSW Art and Design in 2012.

ACO concert at Emanuel shul


THE Australian Chamber Orchestra (ACO), which is celebrating its 40th anniversary this year, will perform in concert for the first time at the Emanuel Synagogue in Woollahra next Monday night.

Led by artistic director Richard Tognetti, the ACO will showcase a string repertoire that includes Tchaikovsky's Serenade for Strings, Mendelssohn's Violin Concerto in E Minor and Ravel's Kaddish.

The concert will also feature a short performance by young musicians from the Emanuel School and other Sydney schools.

Some of the proceeds from the event will go to the Israel Nipper Program, a new water safety education initiative of Australian Friends of Life Saving Israel.

Art in the streets of Tel Aviv

Israeli artists took to the streets of Tel Aviv earlier to create thought-provoking illustrations about city life as part of the annual Illustration Week event, which highlights often overlooked art that people in Israel encounter in their daily lives. **Abigail Klein Leichman** reports.

SOME of Tel Aviv's streets were transformed into a giant art gallery as part of the city's second annual Illustration Week.

About 40 artworks were on display at galleries, cultural centres, schools, coffee houses and bars across the city last month.


Events including gallery talks, seminars, art fairs and sessions with artists were organised by the city's Department of Fine Arts.

Organisers say that Illustration Week was successful in celebrating original Israeli art.

Yuval Saar, the initiator and chief curator of Illustration Week, who is editor of the online design and culture magazine *Portfolio*, comments: "Illustration Week has created a platform for displaying illustration in sites around Tel Aviv that did not exist in the past."

He notes that many of the artists exhibiting this year tackled issues of gender, sexual identity, family and technology.
